


SMTC bike/pedestrian planning studies



Sustainable Streets Project – Sidewalks (2014)

<u>PURPOSE</u>: Lay the groundwork for future pedestrian planning at the municipal level and within roadway capital projects



Including:

- Data gathering

- Identifying Priority Zones for investments

 - City including ratings at the block level
- Sidewalk Ordinances
 - Inventory
 - Intra-county comparison, Models from other towns
- Research
 - Funding / Average costs
 - Benefits
 - Planning approaches
 - Legal aspects

- Pedestrian Demand Model
 - Analysis for SMTC's Planning Area
 - Scores based on proximity and mix of uses
- Priority Zones
 - Focus areas for maintenance and gap closure
- Reference Document
- Application Study



Sustainable Streets Project – Sidewalks

Application Study

Town of Geddes:

 Pedestrian access to Western Lights Shopping Plaza



EXISTING CONDITION: Multiple driveways and a lack of sidewalks on the south side of Onondaga Boulevard near the Onondaga / Velasko intersection make for a hazardous and unappealing pedestrian environment.

The study:

- ID obstacles to pedestrian access.
- Applied concepts from Phase I Sustainable Streets Project
- ID possible improvements to ped access in study area ranging from crosswalk striping to access control.
- Nearly complete



Erie Canalway Trail (ECT)

SYRACUSE CONNECTOR ROUTE PROJECT

- Requested by City of Syracuse, SMTC
- Develop plan to complete the ECT through Syracuse
- Short-term, on-road route (Part I, completed 2013)
- Permanent route, off-road to extent possible/desired (Part II)

- Signage

- Encourage alternative modes






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


Bike Commuter Corridor Study, 2013

- Identified corridors that best support a high average cycling speed to encourage long-distance commutes
- Identified "planning-level" corridor improvements
- Outlined a multijurisdictional bike commuter corridor network

Funding of bike/pedestrian projects

- On average, 6-7% of TIP money is spent on bike/ped projects:
 - Loop the Lake Trail
 - Creekwalk
 - Connective Corridor
 - South Salina Street Valley
 Plaza Corridor Improvements
- In some cases, smaller bike/ped projects make more sense to complete via other sources



Building bike/pedestrian projects

- SMTC is a planning level agency
- Road ownership usually determines who is responsible for implementing
- Sometimes multiple owners (Erie Blvd ex.)
 - Potential maintenance issues
 - Different views
