

HOW CNY WORKS One Group Center Session OCL Study Session 6: "A longitudinal look at CNY's economy." 12/7/2016, 12:00 PM – 1:30 PM

The current study, "*How CNY Works: Examining the Diversity of our Economic Base – Past, Present & Future,*" began on 9/27 at the Salt Museum. Our first session helped establish important historical context. Session two looked at our region's economic base today, and in the emerging future. Session three looked at work and the role of organized labor. Session four focused on economic development and included a wide variety of practitioners. Session five examined workforce development efforts and considered how CNY residents become connected to jobs. Session six will help us imagine the past and future of CNY's economic base, looking at the history of a business district in early Syracuse, then examining emerging trends, alternatives in work and wages, the future of work, and implications in terms of public policy, economic ecosystem, and poverty reduction.
